On behalf of the Alumni Interfraternity and Sorority Board, we are pleased to share with you updates from the undergraduate Greek community at Lafayette. The AISB works to support the undergraduate Greek experience and to keep our alumni aware of the robust Greek life experience at Lafayette today. As you'll read in the following pages, the Greek community is strong and continues to serve an integral role in the success of Lafayette College.

The Greek community is strong. There are 737 students currently affiliated with a Greek chapter. Undergraduates excel in the classroom and broader Lafayette community, with an all-Greek GPA of 3.48! Forty-five members were recognized for excellence at the 2023 Honors Convocation and two chapters were recognized as the Student Organization of the Year ("Serving their Membership") at the Aaron O. Hoff Awards. Most impressive, five of the Pepper Prize finalists from the Class of 2023 were members of a Greek chapter!

There is more work to be done. Greek leaders from across campus came together in March for the 2nd Annual Fraternity & Sorority Life (FSL) Workshop. Sponsored by the Division of Student Life, the goal of the workshop was to discuss ways to enhance and strengthen the Greek experience. As a result, the AISB is researching ways to increase awareness of mental health resources, decrease the financial burden of FSL membership, better educate new members, and help all members succeed in the classroom. Please consider supporting the Greek Fund – a fund that supplements programs that benefit the Greek community such as leadership conferences and campus speakers.

Much thanks and gratitude. This newsletter would not be possible without the collective work of our 12 undergraduate chapters. Special thanks to Emma Chen '24 and Justin Bharucha '24 who lead the Panhellenic and Interfraternity Councils. I hope that everyone had a wonderful summer. I am just putting this message to update you on some initiatives going on within the fraternity and sorority community at Lafayette.

Since the last publication, we wrapped up our spring semester.

- We hosted our 2nd Annual FSL Community Workshop, facilitated by Tara Fuller.
- Our community hosted FSL Fest, which was successful in reaching more unaffiliated students. Our most successful events were Snow Cones on the Quad, Preview Day (pulling in nearly 200 students to both Panhellenic and IFC recruitment), and our DEI Speaker: LaShatá Grayson's keynote about microaggessions and how to actively work towards building an anti-racist culture within our community.
- The Fraternity & Sorority Life community received funding to partner with the Timothy J. Piazza Center for Fraternity and Sorority Research and Reform to survey the experiences of our FSL students. Additional, information will be coming regarding what was learned and how it has aided in supporting our community.

This fall semester, we have a few new initiatives and some continuations from the previous year.

- We will be hosting our first New Member Education Program for the entire new member class covering topics, such as the history of FSL at Lafayette, what is the purpose of the councils, risk management, and life-long siblinghood.
- I will be hosting a presentation over Family Weekend to educate parents on our community and what to be aware of.
- The FSL community will be getting more involved with Homecoming this year in a collaborative effort with Alumni Relations.
- Fall means it's accreditation season. This year is the first year that the
 presentations will be open to anyone and everyone. As the focus is on chapter
 accomplishments and pride, we are hoping that the open access will show the
 Lafayette community the positives of our FSL organizations more transparently.
- We will wrap up the year with our 2nd Annual Fraternity & Sorority Award Ceremony. Alumni interested in attending are welcome to do so.

As always, the aim of my work is to provide the most fulfilling fraternal experience to our students and to provide them with the tools to succeed post-grad. Your support has been invaluable.

Major: Biology


Thesis: Predicting the therapeutic capabilities of macrophages: Validation of a computational model

RECRUITMENT

At the beginning of Fall '23, members of the IFC began preparing and initiated a successful Fall Recruitment. There were 149 PNMs who registered for Fall Recruitment, and 117 who accepted bids from one of the six fraternities on campus, marking a 78.5% retention rate. PNMs were required to participate in Diversity, Equity & Inclusion initiatives such as breakout rooms during recruitment. IFC plans to hold Spring '24 Recruitment for fraternities that wish to participate. The IFC hopes that current NMs can foster strong connections with alumni.



SEMESTER IN REVIEW

The IFC consortium continues to maintain aa strong presence on campus, not only within the FSL community, but outside. Members of the community continue to exemplify leadership positions on campus, whether it be helping with Lafayette's Orientation process (LEOs), or being RAs in dorms. Many IFC members hold positions in organizations such as Pards Against Sexual Assault (PASA), LEAP, and Mock Trial.

The IFC is currently planning on revising its Constitution, spearheaded by President Justin Bharucha '24, as well as getting more involved with various outside organizations at Lafayette College for partnered events.



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Academics and Leadership

Our chapter is currently in the Diamond Society with an average GPA of 3.5 +. We also hosted a brunch during which Professor Sunderland came to talk with us. We are very excited for another professor lecture this semester. Additionally, some of our sisters have been representing the Zeta Theta chapter off campus. Kate Demaree attended the NGLA conference, and Maddy Tallman went to the Alpha Gamma Delta Empower Leadership Conference. Both Carly Johnson and Bri Hartman were selected for the AGD conference this academic year.

Wellness and Sisterhood

The Zeta Theta chapter has attended multiple educational events, including Safe Zone training, a PAVE seminar about healthy relationships, and a microaggression presentation. We are also proud to announce we have reframed our chapter meeting model in order to value time together. We now have weekly sisterhood events to help build bonds across class years and throughout the chapter;. We also host larger events such as Paint and Sip or Fams-giving each month. Additionally, our sisters recognize one another by identifying a Sister of the Week and a Senior of the Week. This semester, we are looking forward to sister-mother/sister daughter celebration, a LRAJE spiral discussion, and a talk on mental health issues.

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Last year, our chapter has completed over 800 hours of service, raised \$1600 for the Alpha Gamma Delta Foundation, worked with Father's House weekly, and packaged 10,000 meals for families in need through Rise Against Hunger. We have also hosted or participated in events such as Alpha Grabba Donut, Alpha Gam Kan Jam, March Madness Brackets, and our Spring Spinner. Outside of our Philanthropy, we have worked with other organizations on campus including PASA's Denim Day fundraiser, Lafayette's Relay For Life, and a fundraiser for Turkey–Syria Earthquake relief. We are looking to upcoming fundraisers for suicide prevention, breast cancer awareness, and the Eastern PA Trans Equity Project as well as volunteering at Easton Garden Works.

Community

In the spring, Zeta Theta partnered with several organizations, including the groups mentioned in the iPhilanthropy section. This fall, we are highly anticipating a fundraiser for the equestrian team and partnering with PASA for another event, Our chapter is the only Greek Organization that has managed to do an event with every other Greek organization on campus; this includes our mock recruitment with DG, New Member event with APHI and PI PHI, pizza party with KKG, our spinner and Kan Jam with Chi Phi, March Madness bracket fundraiser with Chi Phi and Phi Psi, Pizza Palooza and Spinner with DU, and the fundraiser for 9/11 Tunnels for Towers with every other Greek organization on campus.

Sharing our recent accomplishments, makes us even more excited for the future of our chapter. We most recently won the awards for most campus involvement and greatest achievement in recruitment. Our chapter is also in IHQ's Crescent Society, putting us in the top 11% of AGD chapters internationally.


DEI Education:


Sisterhood Events:




